DO YOU KNOW YOUR ZONE IN THE EVENT OF A TSUNAMI?

As part of our commitment in helping to keep your tamariki safe Taipa Area School has recently purchased an Indoor Tsunami Siren. These have been developed by Northland Civil Defence to complement the outdoor tsunami siren network to help keep you and your whanau safe in the event of a Tsunami.

In conjunction with the purchase of the alarm we have also updated our evacuation plans if a tsunami is expected.

We are ready and prepared for evacuation. Remember what never happens.... Happens! It is also a timely reminder as a household to identify whether you live, work or play within a tsunami evacuation zone. Message from the Northland Public Health Unit

With 28 cases of measles in Canterbury, and two new cases in Auckland, now is the perfect time to make sure your child is up to date with their immunisations against measles.

Two doses of the MMR vaccine are needed for maximum protection, but if your child is under 4, one dose of MMR is considered enough as they are still 'on

schedule' for immunisations – the second dose is given at age 4.

If you are not sure if your child is immunised, check in your Well Child book, or talk to the Practice Nurse at your usual General Practice.

If your child is not up to date with their measles vaccines, they are at higher risk of contracting measles. Unimmunised children (or children who have only had one MMR after they turn 4) who are even only exposed to measles could face up to two weeks off school while they wait to see if measles develops, causing enormous disruption in families.

Those who actually contract measles fare worse, as measles is a very unpleasant illness. Make sure your child is up to date with their MMRs!

We suspect cases in Northland soon, so please don't delay.

It is based on our story around the waka Mamaru and the original story of our school motto from 1956 when Taipa District High School first began. *(Excerpt taken from Taipa District High School's first year book): As the memorial monument near the school tells that Kupe landed here, and again later the "Mamaru" as one of the canoes of the Great Fleet pulled in here after coming from Hawaiki, a presentation of a Polynesian canoe has been chosen as the emblem for the School.*

Enduring the privations of an unfriendly and expansive ocean, these early pioneers, perhaps the supreme navigators of all time achieved their landfall. Indomitable courage and great skill were surely theirs. And are these any less necessary today? Therefore, pupils, let the message of your badge speak through your lives. exhibition of qualities of leadership, endurance, co-operation and devotedness to a chosen cause.
